




New Loan Approvals!

In addition, a CDBG loan was approved for Preferred Electric. This Washington Twp. business is moving across the parking lot to a larger facility that will better serve its growing needs.

Interest Rate Update

In previous reports, we commented that interest rates were expected to continue rising. We were right. The October 20 year note rate has returned to its upward trend, jumping 0.243% in a single month. That's the single largest increase since February 2018 when rates increased by 0.300%



The <u>Master of Science in Logistics and Supply Chain Management</u> program and the <u>Master of Information Systems</u> are two unique, accredited programs with both on-campus (residency) and online components designed for the working professional. Distance is generally not a major factor in any decision to participate in these programs because most of the work is online.
