






BRING YOUR GREEN 2020 CHALLENGE

Last year, 2020 marked the 3rd Bring Your Green challenge as sponsored by Dayton Regional Green, AES (formerly DP&L), CenterPoint Energy, IGS Energy and Energy Optimizers USA where Miami Valley businesses, organizations and schools were challenged to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, energy and resources used while reducing costs. It also marked a world with unprecedented challenges to public health with COVID 19 pandemic!

The challenge was different this year; engagement was difficult with restrictions, social distancing and uncertainty. However, despite all that, BYG participants DELIVERED!



BIG IMPACT

The BYG platform allowed cumulative environmental and economic results for Bring Your Green 3.0 participants. These numbers prove that together, we can make a difference.

HIGHLIGHTS:

- More than 40,281 tons of CO2 release prevented
- \$3.8 million estimated in energy cost savings
- 48.7 million kwh in electricity saved
- 376,900 CCF in gas saved
- Equivalent to taking 5,480 homes off the grid, 7,821 cars off the road

2021 BRING YOUR GREEN GIVING GARDEN CHALLENGE



On April 22, 2021, Montgomery County Commissioners, Dayton Regional Green, Agraria Regenerative Farm and Five Rivers MetroParks launched the Giving Garden challenge to encourage any garden that donates food to the community or implements sustainable regenerative practices that regenerates the soil, restores biodiversity and mitigates climate change.

Eleven Organizations and 32 individuals participated in the challenge. Of the participating organizations, three reported donating 1,234 pounds of fresh produce to feed the hungry during the May-October 2021 challenge, proving again that together, we can make a difference.
