JobsOhio and DDC would like to invite you to an information session introducing new programming coming online in 2020 for speculative site development.

During this session our team will roll out the new competitive grant/loan program that may be used for speculative site and/or building development, outline JobsOhio's goals for filling gaps in the state's existing property inventory, and lay the road map for how to seek support for your project.

With \$50 million allocated per year over the next five years (\$250 million total), the Ohio Sites Inventory Program (OSIP) will be made available on a competitive basis to communities, port authorities, and private developers as eligible applicants. While both greenfield and brownfield development will be considered, priority will be given to projects that will produce in-demand inventory that is not currently being created by the private market in sufficient volumes. In-demand inventory definitions and examples will be provided during the information session, but are generally described as sites or buildings with proven data-based demand, capable of meeting the needs of high economic impact projects, especially with respect to potential for future job creation and capital investment.

<u>ODOT Highway Safety Program – 100% project</u> funding for approved safety projects in CY 2020



What are Eligible Projects?

Funding is awarded based on a demonstrated safety problem and/or long-term crash trends. All applications should include information that clearly links the crash patterns with the suggested safety improvement.

The project should meet the following criteria:

- Has 10 or more crashes over a three-year period (per intersection or per mile) OR displays high-injury severity in the crashes. (Special consideration is given to bicycle or pedestrian projects)
- Project sponsor is suggesting a safety improvement known to be effective in addressing the identified crash patterns.
- Projects must be safety and NOT maintenance related. For example, old signal equipment or worn pavement markings are only eligible if their replacement is necessary to address a demonstrated crash problem.

To determine the best solutions for fixing locations, each District Office or local sponsor typically must conduct a formal safety study that includes a review of existing roadway conditions and detailed crash analysis. This analysis helps identify common crash patterns to determine the best strategies to reduce crashes. Safety Analysis Guidelines can be found here: <u>Guidelines</u> (Section 3)

ODOT may waive the formal study for an abbreviated study for low-cost safety requests (example: \$500,000 or less). At a minimum, ODOT will need basic crash trend information and reliable cost estimates for the proposed project.

How to Apply for Safety Funds

ODOT accepts applications twice a year. **The deadlines are April 30 and September 30.** Applications must be reviewed by the District Office before they are submitted to Central Office. Project sponsors should coordinate with the District Office at least 12 weeks in advance of these deadlines – though more time may be necessary for complex projects, which require additional reviews. Early coordination with the District Office is essential to developing a realistic timeline for submitting an application.

Applications are reviewed by multi-disciplinary committees in the District and Central Office. The committees have expertise in safety analysis, roadway design, traffic engineering and highway maintenance. These committees evaluate investments based on factors such as crash analysis; statewide, regional or local priority; and cost/benefit analysis.

Abbreviated Safety Applications

An abbreviated safety application can be submitted through the district office anytime if the project is non-complex and \$500,000 or less. Abbreviated Safety Application Link

In our last *Community Briefing*, we reported that over the summer of 2019, the Land Bank acquired and renovated two tax-delinquent properties in Dayton's Pineview neighborhood, an area where home values were not returning after the housing crisis. The objective has been to increase neighborhood home values and owners' wealth through higher-than-market sales. (A similar effort in 2018 resulted in the sale of a renovated home at 50 percent above the neighborhood's then-market rate.)

One of the homes sold within two weeks of being listed for \$65,000, or 13 percent above the 2018 sale. As we publish this newsletter, the second home, listed for \$84,000, is under contract.

Additional Land Bank projects in Pineview include enhancing gateways to the neighborhood by demolishing eight abandoned houses on Gettysburg Avenue. Also, CityWide Development is working with the Pineview Neighborhood Association on a community plan to enhance Lakeside Lake and other lots on Gettysburg, which will take on a higher profile with the construction of Dayton Metro Library's West Branch at the corner of SR 35 and Abbey Avenue.







NIP demolition: Before and after

After a successful five-year run, the end is in sight for the Land Bank's demolition work under the state's Neighborhood Initiative Program, which is being eliminated. The Land Bank's award was based on consistently meeting the program's metrics. Over time, funding grew to a total of \$20,077,582, which was utilized to demolish 1,168 abandoned and dilapidated structures in nine partner communities.

Coming up: Demolitions 2.0



As the state's Neighborhood Initiative Program wraps up, the Land Bank is looking for ways to continue working with communities to demolish blighting structures.

"The board has asked the staff to develop a program to piggyback on NIP – to the extent our funding allows," said Land Bank executive director Mike Grauwelman.

If approved by the board, the new demolition program will be launched in summer 2020.

Tightened program rules help ensure results



The Tax-Foreclosed Acquisition Program provides interested parties access to properties that require rehab. It is designed to transform vacant and blighted properties into productive assets, thereby stabilizing property values and revitalizing neighborhoods.

In recent months, the Land Bank has added new program rules to strengthen

the requirements for improvements to be completed. The new rules require stricter vetting of the potential buyer, stipulate the buyer complete the Home Buyer's Success Training with the Home Ownership Center of Greater Dayton, and impose a six-month deadline for completion of the improvements.

"This new version puts some teeth into making sure the property is improved and the neighborhood benefits from this transaction," said Susie Crabill, program manager.



Speaking of the Land Bank

On a mission to educate the community and build support for its mission, the Land Bank staff took the organization's message on the road. During 2019, they made presentations to more than 15 organizations and 250 residents and professionals.

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Census 2020

Once every decade, America comes together to count every resident in the United States. The goal is to count everyone once, and only once, and in the right place.

The next Census begins in April 2020.

It Matters

Census 2020 is Ohio's chance to make sure that every individual is counted and has a voice. This opportunity to count the population only comes once every decade and shapes how Ohio spends and operates for the next 10 years.

- It's **easy**; the Census asks you questions about you such as your name and birthday. It typically takes around 10 minutes to complete.
- It's **safe**; all Census responses are kept confidential and cannot be shared - even with law enforcement. All responses are encrypted.
- It's important; it determines the distribution of billions of dollars in federal funding to local communities like yours.
 The count also guides where new schools and hospitals are needed and where to add public safety resources.

Impacts

Making sure everyone in your community submits a Census form significantly increases the benefits local communities could have. Federal funds, grants and support to communities are based on population totals and demographic breakdown.

This information comes from Census results, which directly impact:

- Legislation for community initiatives
- Development of neighborhoods and businesses
- Availability of public resources



In 2010, 78% of the citizens of our county participated in the Census, which left roughly \$50 million in potential funding on the table. We hope to increase the participation rate for 2020 by at least 10%.
